METRO/SW TASK FORCE FOR TC DAMIEN

The following email was received thanking and acknowledging the contribution made by SES Volunteers in assisting after TC Damien.

"I was recently the Task Force Leader for the deployment to Karratha of SES teams from the metro and SW areas. As a relatively new person to DFES this was the first time I had worked this closely with the SES.

The task force was split into 3 teams (2 metro and 1 SW) and comprised of volunteers from units across these regions. We were there predominantly to support the Pilbara SES units and in particular Karratha SES. The teams started work almost as soon as they landed and over the next 4 days contributed to clearing around 230 RFA's. Working with the Karratha unit and a team from Onslow they were split into 2 shifts working 6 hours. The conditions were very hot and humid.

I would like to go on record and say how proud I was to have led this Task Force. The teams performed in a very professional manner and dealt with everything that was put in front of them without complaint. They integrated very well with the Pilbara teams. The team leaders did an excellent job of organising and tasking teams and ensuring their continuous welfare. This made my job much easier and allowed me to concentrate on other
