

Chairman's Report - Gordon Hall ESM

The National Board is now into its 6th year and going from strength to strength and building up positive relations around the country with suppliers and emergency service agencies.

The support this Association receives from the staff of AFAC, and others is a result of working together for the common good and is greatly appreciated.

There have been a few challenges in the emergency services this year which has drawn on the available time of the Board Members. As a result of this the Board is considering adding a member to the Board to pick up a lot of the administration of the raffles and other tasks as they come along.

Affect of the Corona Virus (Covid-19)

Last year I reported on the effect of the global pandemic (declared by the WHO on 11 March 2020) which had been going for more than 3 months at the time of that report.

AFAC20 was cancelled and this Association was unable to do a presentation at that conference. Members were unable to be updated on the latest happenings within the emergency services and of course there was no networking. We will see what AFAC21 brings.

Zoom meetings were conducted for the bi-monthly Board meetings and the executive group meetings. Virtual meetings do not have the same dynamics as face to face however these are the times we live in, and we make it work.

Administration

The executive group has carried on with the general administration of the Association.

The accountant, Alina Tuladhar (CPA), is doing a great job and advising us when appropriate.

The addition of another person to the team in 21/22 will assist in the day to day raffle matters as well as gathering data for our research papers, such as the Jurisdictional Structures.

Representation on External Committees

The number of National committees we are represented on has increased this year. Activity on these committees was reduced, due to Covid-19, however the use of Zoom and Teams provided a different platform to work and provide the required interaction.

Raffle Fund Raising

IIn the financial year 20/21, the states/territories were divided into two groups for raffle callings.

NSW, ACT and NT were called by 4 Mile and QLD, VIC and TAS were called by CD.

For NSW, ACT and NT a total of 7 raffles were scheduled for the year 2020/2021 with the 7th raffle overlapping the financial year.

For QLD, VIC and TAS a total of 4 raffles were scheduled for the year 2020/2021. Due to the unforeseen circumstance of Covid -19 pandemic only 3 were called.

Collectively, a total of 10 raffles were called during 2020/2021.

Total raffle dollar value in sales has increased by 61% over the 2020/2021 financial year (compared to 2019/2020). In the year 2019/2020, 5 raffles were drawn compared to 10 raffles in 2020/21.

There are a total of 10 raffles scheduled for 2021/22 with 6 raffles scheduled for 4 mile and 4 raffles scheduled for Unity 4.

Total dollar value in sales projected to decrease by 5 %. (Compared to 2020/21) and increase by 53% (compared to 2019/20).

Governance

As in the past the auditor has provided guidance to the Board and the NSESVA accountant and has been very supportive and positive about the administration of the raffle and the management of the Board.

National Memorial Service

This service, remembering fallen Emergency Services personnel, was cancelled for 2020. This year a service was conducted. Due to Covid-19, the number of attendees was not as large as previous years. The NSESVA was represented by a number of members who attended and the NSESVA Chair laid a wreath in remembrance of the Emergency Services personnel.

The Future

As we move forward and the virus comes under control and we learn to live with whatever is acceptable, there is much to do to assist in the states and territories.

Like the "Women in the Emergency Services" challenge there is much that can be done by advocacy, by subtle messages and by being part of the solutions to the issues.

The reports of cultural behaviours in the emergency services has become a challenge. This Association has been discussing the matter and will be working with appropriate agencies in the coming year.

The efforts of the Directors and Councillors is making a positive effect on the SES Volunteers and the Communities they serve.

Gordon started in 1993 as an SES Volunteer with the Swan Unit of the WA SES. During that time, he was involved in a number of searches and operations, including floods, storms and cyclone responses.

Gordon has been involved in the WA SES Volunteers Association since 1995 and has served as an SES Consultative Committee representative.

Structure


The National State Emergency Service Volunteers Association is a coalition of each State and Territory Volunteers Association.

A Board of Directors oversees the operation of the organisation. The President (or equivalent) of each State and Territory Volunteers Association is appointed as a Director of the organisation. The positions of Vice Chair and Secretary/Treasurer of the National Association provide leadership to the Board in formulating strategy, policy, risk and financial management.

Each State and Territory may also nominate an independent representative from their own State or Territory Association to become a member of the National Council. These representatives and the Board form the National Council. The National Council considers, researches and makes recommendations to the Board on issues that are relevant to State and Territory Emergency Service Volunteers.

The Chair, Vice Chair and Secretary/Treasurer are elected by the National Council and they form the executive group to take care of the day to day business.

No person may serve for more than six (6) years in a position.



1. Reporting entity

National State Emergency Service Volunteers Association Ltd ("the Company") is incorporated and domiciled in Australia as a company limited by guarantee. The address of the Company's registered office is 54 Moruya Street, Kaleen ACT 2617.

The financial statements of the Company are as at and for the year ended 30 June 2021.

The principal activities of the Company are to consolidate and represent the views of the members of National State Emergency Service Volunteers Association Ltd in dealing with its members, the Government, media and the general public and to support the development of the organisation nationally to support SES volunteers.

2. Basis of preparation

(a) Statement of compliance

National State Emergency Service Volunteers Association Ltd applies Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements as set out in AASB 1053: Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards and AASB 1010-2: Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Reduced Disclosure Requirements

The financial report is a general purpose financial report which has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards — Reduced Disclosure Requirements and interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ("AASB"), the Corporations Act 2001. The company is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements were approved by the Board of Directors on 18 September 2021.

(b) Basis of measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

(c) Functional and presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars, which is the Company's functional currency.

(d) Use of estimates and judgements

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with AASBs requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets and liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised and in any future periods affected.

Information about critical judgements in applying accounting policies that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements and assumptions and estimation uncertainties that have a significant risk of resulting in a material adjustment within the next financial year, are included in the notes to the financial statements.

3. Significant accounting policies

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements, which addresses changes in accounting policies.

(a) Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis, which contemplates continuity of business and the realization of assets and settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

The Company has recorded a surplus of \$219,303 for the year ended 30 June 2021 (2020: \$68,313), total retained carnings of \$123,664 (2020: accumulated losses of \$95,639). The working capital amounted to \$203,664 (2020: deficiency of \$15,639).

The ability of the company to remain as a going concern is dependent on the following:

 The company achieving its forecast results in order to enable them to generate sufficient cash flow to maintain its operations, and growth of revenue in States and Territories which have had a lower uptake for donations historically.

After reviewing the forecast cash flows, the directors of National State Emergency Service Volunteers Association Ltd consider the company will continue to fulfill all obligations as and when they fall due for the foreseeable future. The Directors believe the cash flow required is achievable and accordingly consider that the company's financial statements should be prepared on a going concern.

Accordingly, no adjustment have been made to the financial statements relating to the recoverability and classification of recorded asset amount, or to amounts and classifications of liabilities that might be necessary should the company not continue as a going concern

(b) Income tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(c) Financial Instruments

Recognition and measurement

Financial instruments are initially measured at cost on trade date, which includes transaction costs when the related contractual rights or obligations exist. Subsequent to initial recognition these instruments are measured as set out below:

Financial assets at fair value through profit and loss

A financial asset is classified in this category if acquired principally for the purpose of selling in the short term or if so designated by management and within the requirements of AASB139: Recognition and Measurement of Financial Instruments. Derivatives are also categorised as held for trading unless they are designated as hedges. Realised and unrealised gains and losses arising from changes in fair value of these assets are included in the statement of comprehensive income in the period in which they arise.

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in the active market, and are stated at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

Held-to-maturity investments

These investments have fixed maturities, and it is the Company's intention to hold these investments to maturity. Any held-to-maturity investments are stated at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

(c) Financial Instruments

Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale financial assets include any financial asset not included in the above categories. Availablefor-sale financial assets are reflected at fair value. Unrealised gains and losses arising from changes in fair value are taken directly into equity.

Financial liabilities

Non-derivative financial liabilities are recognised at amortised cost, comprising original debt less principal repayments and amortisation.

Fair value

Fair value is determined based on current bid prices for all quoted investments. Valuation techniques are applied to determine the fair value for all unlisted securities, including arms-length transactions, reference to similar instruments and option pricing models.

Impairment

At each reporting date, the directors assess whether there is objective evidence that a financial instrument has been impaired. In the case of available-for-sale financial instruments, a prolonged decline in the value of the instrument is considered to determine whether impairment has arisen. Impairment losses are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

(d) Impairment of assets

At each reporting date, the directors review the carrying values of tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the assets value, less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the assets carrying value. Any excess of the assets carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the statement of comprehensive income.

(e) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks or financial institutions, other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

(f) Revenue

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Raffles revenues are recognised when the respective raffles are drawn and the amounts have been received from customers. Raffle ticket entries are issued once the pledged amount is received. It is not possible for the Company to reliably estimate the number of pledges that will result in raffle tickets being issued in each competition.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Donation and bequest revenues are recognised when the Company receives the amounts pledged.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(g) Goods and Services Tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the taxation authority. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition or the asset, or as part of an item of expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financial activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

(h) Financial income and expenses

Financial income comprises interest income on funds invested that are recognised in profit or loss. Interest income is recognised as it accrues in profit or loss, using effective interest method.

(i) Accounts payable and other payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liabilities outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the Company during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(j) New standards and interpretations not yet adopted

A number of new standards, amendments to standards and interpretations are effective for annual reporting periods beginning after 1 July 2020, have not been applied in preparing these financial statements. None of these are expected to have a significant effect on the financial statements of the company.

The History of the National SESVA

In the late 2000s, some SES Volunteers discussed setting up a National body to represent the SES Volunteers.

At the 2012 AFAC Conference in Perth, a small group of SES Volunteers from WA and NSW, gathered behind some partitions and had a chat about when, where and how. The SES Volunteers were Peter Lalor ESM, Gordon Hall ESM, David Price ESM, Dave Beard, John Capes, Charlie Moir and one other.

The then NSW SESVA Chair, Charlie Moir ESM, pledged support from the NSW SESVA to assist and provide some funding to make this happen.

A working group (NWG) was set up in 2013 consisting of SESVAs from NSW, Victoria, ACT, South Australia and Western Australia.

The NSW SESVA became the lead agency for the NWG, and all meetings were chaired by Charlie Moir ESM, President NSW SESVA. Documentation for meetings was provided by the NSW SESVA, including arranging accommodation, preparing agendas, supporting papers, preparing meeting notes, information, recording and distribution of Minutes.

Qld and the NT joined the working group in 2014.

Tasmania joined the National Association in mid-2018.

At the working group meetings, a number of ideas were tabled and discussed with agreements on;

- Objectives of the future Company,
- Structure and voting,
- A National Council to be formed

The Board of Directors were originally restricted to association Presidents and later modified to include an independent Director and Chair.

Councillors were provided by each Association (one each). They were required to enter into discussions with the Board and its members and were assigned projects together with Board members.

It was intended that these would be representative of the relevant associations' members and were not to be paid association or agency employees.

The constitution was discussed and eventually submitted.

Other items such as funding, raffles, and preparation of documents to compare the different states and territories were discussed at these working group meetings.

NSESVA - The History (continued)

In May 2015, the NSESVA was officially formed as a Company, with the Registered Office, required consents, ACNC registration and other administrative matters all being completed.

Directors and Councillors were assigned specific projects and reported progress at each meeting.

Many of those projects will always be ongoing and the Directors will continue to work at those national tasks.

A succession of changes were made to the constitution to meet the changing needs.

The registration of the Association as a limited liability, not-for-profit company, also facilitated taking over the income-generating raffle that NSW SES VA had used, not only to fund itself but also our association through its formation process, enabling the national association to generate income across the nation.


