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Stirling SES has a lot to Celebrate

Stirling SES is about to embark on a new journey with the purchase late last year of an existing facility in Osborne Park.

It has been a long journey for Stirling SES who has been looking at potential land and suitable properties for over 25 years. This is a new concept that has never been tried before in Western Australia with DFES purchasing the existing facility in late 2023 and handover to the City of Stirling soon after. Stirling SES has been in its current location since around 1998 with the unusual situation of having the vehicles located in a shed some 400 m away from the EOC.

The new location will house vehicles and the EOC in the one location and is situated on land 2000m² and a building size of around 950 m² including office and training rooms. The size of the building will allow for growth over the coming years. DFES is working closely with the City of Stirling to bring the facility up to SES specification. It is anticipated that the unit will move from their existing location to the refurbished premises in the second half of 2024. Watch this space for further updates and a potential opening ceremony.

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DFES VOLUNTEER TRAINING FORUM PART 2

We don't get a straight forward process known as Recognition of current Competency (RCC) with other SES States and Territories. This is one of our major issues right now and it was covered at the forum in some detail.

As a result, there will be discussion and opportunity to improve this aspect. I can appreciate it won't happen overnight but some quick fixes could be made after consultation and a plan of attack developed.

A large amount of material and ideas will be collected to deal with this aspect and, I for one, want to play my part to see it fixed. I am sure there are many stories SES Volunteers can recall at local unit level of members who presented strong, supporting paperwork from another state or an industry sector within their own state; skills and knowledge not unlike SES, but were told to do the whole course again. **Wrong.** Depending on the risk level (low, medium, high) of the skill it could be simply rectified with reliable 'Third Party' evidence. It might require sitting a theory paper, interview or a challenge assessment at the high risk level. The nuts and bolts of RCC in some cases will require some work but should resolve many of the cases of RCC documents that sit in trays un-actioned.

There was huge emphasis on an **Integrated Training Model (ITM)** which is about developing and using new technology and strategies (whilst also using the current, standard approaches) to deliver initial training but also to maintain and assess currency and proficiency of operators across many 'crucial skills' and Divisions of DFES. I am sure a lot of members will encourage this aspect being developed across the board.

The **Initiation and Improvement Recommendation (IIR)** on-line form was also covered. DFES are endeavouring to streamline some internal procedures so they can geet to 'action' and respond to 'originators' quicker. Some aspects of the procedure are well before the product is rolled out so consultation improvements may well reduce the number of IIR's entering the system in the first place.

The Standardised **On-Line Induction** was mentioned but it does not have to replace the usual SES Unit Induction process which should also include the materials and topics within the on-line DFES Induction. This will be available to BGU's that want to provide the information in a self-paced format, or when there is only a few volunteers needing to cover this aspect of Induction training. There will still be much to be addressed before the Volunteer moves into the regular training area of e-Academy.

Another aspect revealed at the forum was the Volunteer Hub and the support it can provide to the Volunteer – keep an eye out for a flyer with a QR code to link up with that area and some exciting developments are ahead. Have you seen the monthly notifications coming to your email or when you have gone to the Volunteer Hub page? That work is undertaken by Strategic Volunteer & Youth Programs who want to increase the usefulness of information provided to Volunteers (such as DFES systems and sites being integrated). The QR code will enable you to see what they are doing and they want constructive feedback from Volunteers so things can be improved. There are two strategic projects this group are keen to develop in the coming years - **ChatBot 24/7 support** (in 2024) and **'Personalisation'** (in 2025) so it recognises you as an individual and can assist *you* rather than the 'one size fits all' approach.

How many of you saw or took part in that recent training activity at unit level with the Virtual Reality (VR) activity? This idea will be further enhanced to include other skills and activities across the divisions. It will fit nicely within the blended and integrated learning approach that the DFES Academy management and staff want to pursue over coming years.

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The Economic, Social, and Cultural Value of Volunteering to the Western Australian Community

Last year Volunteering WA produced a report on its research into volunteering in WA. The research concluded that Volunteering yields substantial social and economic benefits for WA.

The \$63.9 billion benefit represents a remarkable 470% return on investment, signifying a return of \$4.70 for every dollar invested in volunteering. The report further estimates the replacement labour cost of volunteering at \$16.5 billion, more than double the cost of the entire WA public sector. Volunteering is identified as a pivotal contributor to community well-being, accounting for a noteworthy 14.7% increase in workplace productivity.

On average, each volunteer contributed 22.6 hours monthly, culminating in a total of 4000 million hours in 2023.

The report produced some staggering statistics that reflect the opportunities and risks for emergency service volunteering. The report summary and insights info graphics can be found at

For a government department that has a volunteer workforce of more than 26,000, more attention needs to be paid to changing the culture of DFES to maximise the opportunities and strengths of its volunteer workforce.

- For every \$1 spent, \$4.70 is returned to the community
- Top 3 motivations of volunteers
 - To help others
 - For enjoyment
 - To be active

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STATE EMERGENCY SERVICE YOUNG EMERGING LEADERS FROM WESTERN AUSTRALIAN ATTEND THE

NATIONAL MEMORIAL SERVICE FOR FIRE AND EMERGENCY SERVICE PERSONNEL

One of the greatest challenges to emergency management in Australia is the ageing workforce, and debate continues over whether younger generations want to take up volunteering, especially considering the demands of training, time and commitment needed in disaster and emergency work. So it is heartening to see the contribution and success of young volunteers from all walks of life who have established their credentials in the emergency sector.

The NATIONAL SESVA Young Emerging Leaders programme gives an opportunity for up to two volunteers from every Australian jurisdiction to travel to Canberra and participate in the annual AFAC National Memorial Service. They meet the Governor-General, have a Parliament House private tour and visit the ACT Emergency Services Agency, the National Situation Room at NEMA and Geoscience Australia.

In 2024 two members from Western Australia were selected: Lauren Bailey from the Mandurah SES Unit and Anjuli Till from the Kalgoorlie-Boulder SES Unit. Their achievements are deserving of this recognition.

Lauren Bailey is a member of the Rescue Team with the Mandurah State Emergency Service. She is also a cadet instructor for the Emergency Service Cadet Corps.

Her role allows Lauren to train and assist the team with bushfire ground support, storm damage, housing damage and community support activities as well as facilitating a youth program with her community's young people.

Lauren is also a member of the DFES Young People's Advisory Council, which she feels privileged to be a part of as this body that provides her the opportunity to promote positivity, drive meaningful change and create a better future for young emergency service personnel.



Anjuli Till is originally from South Africa and moved to Australia in 2010. She spent five years in Army Cadets in Kalgoorlie before relocating to Perth, then relocated back to sunny Kalgoorlie-Boulder. Anjuli has been actively involved with the State Emergency Service for over five years, serving in roles such as Team Leader, Treasurer and Trainer Assessor.

In June 2023, at age 25, she was appointed Local Manager of Kalgoorlie-Boulder SES Unit and in 2023 was honoured with the WAFES Youth Achievement Award for new approaches to training such as including families in overnight land searches and navigation, which supports uptake of young cadets into volunteering.







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My Unit.. SWAN SES UNIT -Part 2: 60TH Anniversary - 1964-2024









December 8 2012 was the official opening of the \$1.2 million purpose built combined Swan Emergency Services Facility (ESF) which houses both Swan SES and the Swan Communication Bushfire Brigade. The State Government funded \$860,000 for the new building, comprising \$700,000 from the FESA Capital Works Program and the \$161,000 from the Emergency Services Levy Capital Grants Scheme.

The City of Swan complemented the Government's contribution by providing \$350,000 for the extension of the sewer lines, building of a carpark and management of the contract.

Ash Smith became the Local Manager in 2015. A Swan logo and motto was developed in 2017 to better reflect the direction of the unit. The new motto was 'Myself, My Team, My Community'. In 2018, Ash moved to DFES employment and Shaun Plumber became the Local Manager.

In 2019 Swan SES received the City of Swan Australia Day 'Active Citizenship Award' for 'Recognising outstanding community contribution".

In 2022 Daryl Coleman took over as Local Manager. Currently, there are 62 volunteers at Swan SES.

Across the 60 years, Swan SES has been involved in significant deployments, major incidents, major exercise, and community engagement. Significant deployments included severe tropical cyclones Elaine & Vance (1999), Moora floods (1999), Adelaide storms and floods (2016), severe tropical cyclone Seroja (2021), NSW floods (2022), and Fitzroy Crossing Floods (2023). Major incidents included the Barrass search near Muchea (1998), Waroona Yarloop fire support (2016), Muchea search (2016), Muchea vehicle control point during COVID (2020), and Wooroloo fire support (2020) where the unit became a staging area for the West Division.

Major exercises included the VES Metro Challenge (1978), Seabird Exercise (1987), Bald Hill Exercise (1988), Goldfields SES Challenge (2011-2014), WA Metro Challenge (2016), Exercise MayDay (2019), and the Walyunga Multi-Agency Exercise (2023).

Community engagement has included support for the Avon descent (1980s), crowd control as the Olympic torch passed through Midland (2000), crowd control for the Perth Christmas pageant (2016 +), and assisting Guildford RSL with the ANZAC Day ceremony (across many years starting in the 1980s).

On Saturday May 18th, Swan SES celebrated their 60th anniversary at Jack Mann Oval, Midland.
