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Grant Funding

We are very pleased to be able to report we have been able to assist Derby SES Unit with obtaining an offer of a 2021 Volunteer Grant from the Australian Government Community Grants Hub..

Under the terms of the Grant Derby SES Unit has until December 2022 to spend the funds on a wide variety of items..

Hardship Scheme

The WA Emergency Service Volunteer Hardship Scheme exists to to provide emergency services volunteers with the opportunity to seek financial assistance during times of hardship.

The scheme is managed by a governing committee consisting of representatives from each of the relevant volunteer associations which together constitute the WA Emergency Services Volunteers Hardship Assistance Scheme (Incorporated).

The Hardship Assistance Fund provides direct relief from hardship to volunteers and their dependants. It is designed to help cover basic living costs such as rent, food and utilities. Financial assistance is not provided for expenses arising as a result of living beyond one's means, or to clear gambling incurred debt, or to fund lifestyle choices.

Applications must be for a volunteer who is a member of an emergency services group created under the Fire and Emergency Services Act 1998; Bush Fires Act 1954; or the Fire Brigades Act 1942 and who has served a minimum of six months (unless in exceptional emergency situations).

What is hardship?

Hardship is when a volunteer is unable to meet minimum living expenses because of unexpected or unforseen events, such as:

Loss of work or reduction of work hours Illness or death of family member Relationship breakdown Accidental injury or illness Emergency event or natural disaster

Up to \$5,000 of hardship assistance can be provided in order for an eligible applicant to meet the following expenses:

Outstanding utility accounts and charges
General household expenses
Expenses for funeral of a family member
Unexpected accounts due to accident or injury
Self-employment expenses
Support for dependent family members
Last resort welfare mechanisms
Medical expenses
Municipal rates
Mortgage or lease expenses

The final decision on an application is made by a sub-committee of the hardship committee and as they say on the application form, is final, and no reason for their decision will be given.

Why is this named after Sir Gordon Freeth KBE?

Let's take a walk down history lane with the SES Nationally.

Biography:

He graduated in law from the University of Western Australia in 1938, the year he rowed in the winning Australian four at the Sydney Empire Games. During the next year he married and set up as a barrister and solicitor at Katanning, WA.

In 1942, Sir Gordon became a pilot with the RAAF and,

according to wartime associates, a good one, flying Beaufort's in New Guinea.

- Was the federal member for Forest (WA 1949 1969) and was made a Knight Commander of the Order of the British Empire (KBE) in 1978.
- He held the following political offices, Minister for the Interior, Minister for Works, Minister for Shipping and Transport, Minister for the Air, Minster Assisting the Treasurer and Minister for Foreign (External) Affairs.
- Australian Ambassador for Japan and Australian High Commissioner to the United Kingdom.

In a ministerial statement in 1959, then federal Minister for the Interior, Gordon Freeth, stated;

"It is a basic principle that the States are responsible for the development of their own civil defence planning and programs with the Commonwealth providing national guidance and coordination as necessary".

From this statement and many other actions, the journey began in the creation of the SES in the Commonwealth. July 1959 the State Emergency Service was established in Western Australia for the purpose of: "coping with civil disasters, including fires, floods, cyclones, railway accidents, crashed aircraft, explosions and the search for lost persons".

The Commissioner of Police was responsible for the operation of the State Emergency Service.

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National Emergency Medal

Your SESVA approached DFES in June 2021 requesting they start the process to have the Federal Government register cyclone Seroja as a major event and issue a National Emergency Medal to the SES Volunteers who attended cyclone Seroja.

We also approached the National SES Association in October 2021 to obtain their assistance in having cyclone Seroja recognised.

This is a very slow process, however we are not letting the matter fade away and are regularly contacting the above to determine progress so far.

At this stage, we believe there is an extremely long way to go.

If you wish to raise the matter with your State and Federal Members of Parliament, that may also assist in progressing the matter.

Volunteer Leadership Program

Applications are now open

The Volunteer Leadership Program (VLP) equips volunteers from community organisations, not-for-profits, disaster relief organisations and local government within the emergency management sector, with the skills and confidence to grow as leaders.

The VLP experience is immersive and collaborative, bringing together volunteers from different organisations and agencies to build knowledge and share experiences with each other. The program explores practical leadership frameworks through interactive learning, and participants gain both self-awareness and an enhanced ability to understand and contribute to their organisations.

To be considered for the VLP, applicants must:

- be an active volunteer working within emergency management, recovery and disaster resilience in Australia.
- be 18 years of age or over on the day the course commences
- be available to participate over the weekend (the program runs from 4:30pm Friday to 2:00pm Sunday)
- have the support of their agency to participate in the program
- be prepared to undertake approximately two hours of pre-course work
- submit an application by the closing date, answering all questions on the application form.

Successful applicants will be notified at least two weeks prior to the course commencing.

The program date in Perth is 13th-15th May 2022 and application are due by 8th April 2022.




