Question to the Minister Albany SES Building

Late last year Kalbarri SES Unit were advised they were being visited by the Minister, and asked to provide details of a question they wished to ask the Minister.

This they did and the question is reproduced below.

To date we have been advised the visit took place and as yet the question has not been answered.

"Question to the Minister

The attempted amalgamation of SES into DFES has been both painful and a dismal failure.

SES Volunteers do not embrace DFES as a controlling agency nor do they respect their operating modes.

SES needs to remain SES to preserve our history and our organisations, to ensure our well proven operating modes are delivering the best to our community.

Why have we had a systemic failure to embrace DFES?

- DFES has demonstrated a largely a fire mentality with little understanding of non-fire volunteers in terms of subject matter and operating modes.
- Nearly all DFES staff are of a fire background and make decisions based on fire service ideas – and the decisions are often not appropriate for non-fire services.
- DFES ethos of one size fits all does not, and cannot work all services have different requirements to manage effectively.
- The system is heavily influenced by the UFU
- According to the Insurance Council of Australia, the most expensive disasters to occur in Australia are natural disasters, not fire based disasters, and yet most of the DFES budget goes to fire services with only a minimal amount to other agencies who manage the major natural disasters.

What would work

Allow SES to operate under a Chief Executive Officer!

SES to remain independent on a day by day basis, but operate with DFES as an overarching entity. (Similar system to the ADF) Any investigation into the above should be balanced and not referred to spin doctors, in order to receive the answer you politically may want.

The SES's voice is the SES Volunteer Association whom you should contact in order to clarify the true position of affairs.

Only then can we move ahead with unity and positive outcomes.

The question to the Minister is

Why can't SES Volunteers be managed to enable them to do what they do best - this requires the appointment of a Chief Executive Officer?

"NEW \$3M STATE EMERGENCY SERVICE HQ FOR ALBANY ABC Great Southern | Facebook January 12 at 3:20 PM ·

A new State Emergency Service facility will be built in Albany.

The State Gov has announced up to \$3 million for a new SES building on Mercer Road.

It will be rated a Level 3 Incident Control Centre, suitable for coordinating large-scale emergencies, and should be open within 18 months.

SES WA Commissioner Darren Klemm says it'll be a big boost to local crews.

"This new facility will put them in a fantastic place in terms of the fit for purpose nature of the facility and it will only enhance their ability to provide their service to the community, and it should also assist them with attracting more members," he says."

The SESVA is very pleased Albany Unit is finally getting their new building, especially after they believed for years that funding for the building had been approved and the finding of a location for the building was the problem.

On investigation by the SESVA in June 2020, we found funding had not been approved, and then suddenly the SESVA Great Southern Representative was advised in August that funding had been found and was approved.

An interesting coincidence.

PS. We love the ABC comment "SES WA Commissioner Darren Klemm" - They are obviously unaware under the current legislation the SES in WA does not have a dedicated Commissioner, not even a dedicated Chief Officer - a Chief Officer being something we would like, and as indicated by the 92% response to our November 2020 survey, so would the SES Units in WA.

History of the SES

The WA State Emergency Service (SES) History from Civil Defence into the 21st Century

This compilation of the history of the State Emergency Service in Western Australia, was intended to bring together as much of the history as possible from the Civil Defence days of the 1930s, to the formation of the State Emergency Service in Western Australia and covers the subsequent years, from when it was part of the Civil Defence and Emergency Service of Western Australia, part of the Police Department, its' own entity as the State Emergency Service, and in more recent years as a clear role within the Fire and Emergency Services Authority of Western Australia and finally in 2012 being merged into a fire culture within the new Department of Fire and Emergency Services.

The book also attempts to cover some of the support aspects of the SES, as well as a number of interesting operations and some of the committees involved.

Two chapters showcase all SES Volunteers who have received state awards or been honoured through the Australian Honours and Awards system for their dedication and distinguished service in the WA State Emergency Service.

It is well recognised by communities at all levels of government that the true altruistic nature of State Emergency Service Volunteers provides significant social capital by instilling a sense of community and caring, a level of civic pride, and a sense of selfreliance and security for their own community.

The book consists of 213 pages with associated pictures and a short history of a number of the SES Units.

There has been a limited number of the books printed and an eBook will be available for downloading in February via Amazon.

It has been compiled by Gordon Hall ESM and has been peer reviewed by John Capes OAM and Allen Gale - all SES Volunteers.

There is a forward by the Minister for Emergency Services and the FES Commissioner.

Over the last few years we have had several requests for SES Number plates.

As the current series has been exhausted, we are now asking if you would like us to start a new series.

A couple of things we need to be aware of from the Dept of Transport(DOT) in order to start the project and to keep it running:

- A series requires an initial order of 30 sets of plates to commence.
- A minimum ongoing demand of 10 plates per year applies thereafter.
- Plates will cost between \$200-260 depending on the plate type decided upon.
- Any other fees set by DOT are payable by the new certificate of entitlement holder.
