The SESVA farewells a dear friend



The SES Volunteer's Association of WA collectively mourns the passing of Craig Masarei, a highly respected legal professional, community leader, and generous volunteer.

Craig gave freely of his time, wisdom, and integrity to support causes that mattered most recently, through his work on the SESVA Legislation sub-committee from 2022 until his passing.

Craig's expertise in law, governance and public service brought immense value to the sub-committee during a critical time of anticipated legislative reform. His thoughtful and principled advice helped shape the SESVA's position on the drafting of the proposed changes to the WA Emergency Services Act. Through his insight, he provided a unique perspective that balanced the needs of volunteers with robust governance frameworks. Craig was instrumental in producing the SESVA's key publications that communicated these complex issues clearly and effectively, leaving a lasting legacy on the direction of emergency services legislation.

Beyond his contributions to the SESVA, Craig served as a Councillor for the Town of Cottesloe from 2019 to 2023, where he passionately advocated for sustainable community development.

Professionally Craig graduated from the University of Western Australia with a law degree and practiced for 15 years before serving as Chief Legal Officer and Company Secretary at Water Corporation for 22 years. He also chaired the Water Corporation Superannuation Plan and the Parkdale Investment and Equity Trust.

His commitment to the broader community was further exemplified through his 22 years of service on the board of Alzheimer's WA Ltd including 19 years as Chair. He was an active member of several professional associations.

Craig will be remembered not only for his impressive professional achievements but also for his humility, generosity, and unwavering commitment to community and volunteer service. His contributions have left an indelible mark on the SESVA and the many communities he passionately served.

We honour Craig's legacy with deep gratitude and extend our heartfelt condolences to his family and all who knew and respected him.

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Metro SES Leaders - Pre Winter Forum Held at the Perth Zoo, Saturday 24 May

Volunteer leaders from SES units across Perth's four Metropolitan regions gathered for the Forum. The event provided an important platform for sharing updates, strengthening relationships, and focusing on volunteer wellbeing.

Led by Lilika Allam, Nannup SES: Serving as MC, Lilika guided the day with professionalism and energy, setting a positive tone for the sessions ahead.

Opening Address: Deputy Commissioner Craig Waters AFSM officially opened the forum, acknowledging the critical contribution SES volunteers make across the state and nationally, especially during storm season across the Metropolitan regions.

Key Sessions:

WA Police – Land Search—Sgt Jason Ralls (Emergency Operations Unit) explained how and when SES teams are deployed for searches, emphasising coordination between WAPOL and DFES.

- Bureau of Meteorology Bunbury Storms—Gianni Colangelo Two major storm events from 2024 were compared, with key lessons shared around forecasting, communication, and response strategies.
- Keynote: Andrew Horrobin (Bullshift) Andrew introduced the "Relationships Ladder" moving from adversarial to collaborative working styles—and challenged attendees to reflect on how relationships shape organisational culture.
- What's New for SES? An overview of recent updates impacting SES fleet, SES lightweight PPC and other. •
- Metro Operational Briefing—Acting Assistant Commissioner David Gill provided key Metropolitan updates specific • to Operations.
- Wellness Focus Mental Health DFES Mental Health and Wellbeing Coordinator Emily Pestell (DFES) offered • strategies for maintaining good mental health and wellbeing in volunteer roles. Information packs were handed out.
- MOVAT: Updates & Features Belmont-Victoria Park SES Stuart Romero (owner/developer) showcased new capa-• bilities and enhancements to the MOVAT system.
- Metro Operations Explained DO John Landwehr The forum concluded with a breakdown of the Metropolitan Duty • Coordinator's role and the functions of the Metropolitan Operations Centre during emergency events.

Closing: Acting AC David Gill thanked all for their service and leadership, and encouraging continued collaboration.

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TRAINING MATTERS

VOLUNTEER TRAINING ADVISORY GROUP UPDATE

The Volunteer Training Advisory Group (VTAG) was formed by DFES to provide a forum to communicate, raise and resolve matters between DFES and Volunteers of DFES (SES, VFES, VFRS and Marine Rescue) and Bushfire (BFB) Services, relating to all aspects of volunteer training. Membership includes nine DFES staff and 10 volunteers (two from each of the Associations including the Bushfire Volunteers Association).

Vice President Alan Hawke and Committee Member Les Hayter represent the SESVA on the VTAG which should meet every six months. From the meeting held on 10th May 2025, we report the following:

New Training Centre

DFES has identified the site of a new all hazards training centre. Project development is pending State Government funding, so completion is a long way off.

Course Development

Training curriculum development for SES and Marine Rescue (MR) is delayed because of DFES staffing. We can only hope that DFES provides the necessary funding to meet its commitments.

Course Improvement Recommendations

Training courses cannot improve without your input using the *Initiation and Improvement Recommendation (IIR)* reports. You can find more information about improving training by submitting your suggestions online via the Volunteer Hub (<u>How to recommend training improvements</u>). This process is the training primary means of communication for changes to training products. We are assured that DFES Training Development Support & Compliance looks at every IIR.

In the past, there was no feedback on IIRs, which is believed to have resulted in a reduction in feedback. The Academy is working on creating a dashboard to remedy the lack of feedback for those who lodge IIRs. This will be a dynamic dashboard and will include historical IIRs. DFES reports that evaluation of the dashboard is in progress. Access is also planned through the Volunteer Hub.

Working at Height Project

The project (Working at height) is progressing to rolling out doctrine and equipment from sometime later in 2025 with completing in 2026. Changes are being brought on by the need to limit (eliminate!) the risk of injury to staff and volunteers. Judging from the feedback received from all services, volunteers will not be happy with the changes. DFES is being influenced by WorkSafe WA and industry standards.

Leadership Training

We can anticipate changes In the near future to leadership training. The starting point will be an online course, *Introduction to Leadership.* This will be a 10 minute course in modules. To progress to any leadership role, volunteers will then need to complete *Leadership 1.* This will be a two day course that replaces *Leadership Fundamentals*. New topics are expected to include mentoring and coaching. For volunteers in more senior leadership roles, there will be a *Leadership 2* course. District officers and above will progress to Leadership 3 and GradCert Leadership.

Nationally Recognised Training

After research and consultation with SES units, the overwhelming view of volunteers is the desire for volunteers to be credited with nationally recognised training, such as Certificate II and III (SES Operations). The Association is working with DFES to enable funding to support this proposal.

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Salient points from the Policy Paper

- Natural Disasters occur every year. Future disasters are more likely than not to occur
- We know with absolute certainty that future disasters will have a material effect on the fiscal outlook over the forward estimates.
- National cost of natural disasters is around \$6 billion over forward estimates.
- There is considerably greater return on spending ahead of disasters than after the fact.
- Not recognising future disaster expenditure falls short of transparent and responsible budgeting, distorts decision making, and creates a bias against investment in climate adaptation.

Policy Paper: Budgeting for Natural Disasters

Transparency and accuracy in the fiscal treatment of disaster recovery

Australia is facing an escalating number of natural disasters, with each event requiring substantial government recovery expenditure.

In just the past six months, tropical cyclone Alfred struck Queensland and New South Wales, while severe bushfires swept through the Grampians National Park. These events and their associated recovery costs, are not exceptions; future disasters are inevitable.

Yet, our federal budget continues to treat these inevitable costs as uncosted contingent liabilities, failing to account for their predictable impact.

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Team Echo: A Journey of Resilience in the Aftermath of Cyclone Alfred

In the wake of Cyclone Alfred's impact on Brisbane and Queensland in March 2025, the call for assistance echoed across Australia. The Qld State Emergency Service (SES) was mobilising teams from various states to aid in the recovery efforts. Among them was WA SES Team Echo, a group of dedicated volunteers from country Western Australia, ready to lend a helping hand to those in need.

Among the volunteers was a group of experienced and seasoned SES members with a passion for community service. They had been with the SES for many years, responding to emergencies ranging from bushfires, rescues to floods. When they received the notification about the deployment to Brisbane, they felt a mix of excitement and determination. They knew that the aftermath of a cyclone could be chaotic, but they were ready to face the challenges ahead.

As Team Echo arrived in Brisbane the scene was one of quiet calm. The vibrant Moreton Bay Islands of the off the coast of Brisbane was now a landscape of fallen trees, damaged homes and debris scattered across the streets. The air was thick with the smell of wet earth and the sounds of chainsaws and machinery as crews worked tirelessly to clear the damage. We all felt a surge of purpose as we stepped off the barge, ready to make a difference.

The team was quickly briefed on their mission: to assist with debris and tree removal, provide support to affected families, and help restore essential community spirit. We were grouped into teams focused on clearing roads and helping residents access their homes. With chainsaws, shovels and a strong sense of camaraderie, Team Echo set to work.

As they moved through the neighbourhoods, the impact of the cyclone became more apparent. Some homes were uninhabitable, and families were displaced, seeking shelter in evacuation centres. The teams worked alongside local volunteers, clearing fallen trees and debris from driveways and roads, allowing emergency services to reach those in need.

One day, while cleaning a particularly challenging area, they encountered a lady who seemed to have lost everything. Standing outside her home she watched the SES crews work in a neighbouring house. She was scared to engage with the teams and very anxious about her personal safety. Trust needed to be established, which took some time, but the professional conduct of the team helped dissolve long held cultural barriers including mistrust of government and authorities, enabling the team to provide the assistance she needed.

With the help of Team Echo, we organised a temporary repair and connected her with local support services. We sincerely hope that provided food, clothing and emotional support helping her navigate the immediate aftermath of the cyclone. Our hearts swelled with pride as we witnessed the resilience of the community coming together to support one another in this time of need.

The deployment reached conclusion, but Team Echo continued its efforts to restore normalcy, clearing debris, assisting with rebuilding and providing emotional support.

Listening and learning provides our teams an invaluable opportunity for community interaction and experience their appreciation. There's a reason we do what we do: the satisfaction of helping others in need. Feeling Orange, that's what feeling Orange is.

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Esperance SES Marks 60 Years of Service

On April 12th the combined Esperance SES and Marine Rescue celebrated with a Sundowner at their Colocation building.



SESVA President, Greg Cook, presented a plaque on behalf of the Management Committee to the Esperance SES in recognition of sixty years of dedicated service to the local and neighbouring communities by the SES volunteers. Speeches and presentations were made before the local volunteers and other volunteers who travelled from Albany, Mount Barker and Kalgoorlie as well as many invited guests from as far way as Perth.

Local Manager and Commander Leonie Henderson gave a detailed account of the 60 year history of the two services. Her presentation highlighted key milestones, from the unit's formation in 1964 as the Civil Defence and Emergency Service, through decades of major operations, infrastructure development, and evolving capabilities. Members recalled defining moments such as the 1967 search for three fishermen at Cape Le Grand, the 1976 joint SAS training exercise "Operation Mandrabilia", and more recent achievements, including the launch of Volunteer 4 and the acquisition of the new Dolphin remote controlled life buoy in 2024.

The evening was not only a reflection on past achievements but a celebration of the volunteers—past and present whose dedication has shaped the organization into what it is today. Several long serving members were recognized with service medals, ranging from 10 to 50 years.

Guests also heard about the future direction of the unit, including planned training initiatives, equipment upgrades, and an ongoing commitment to community safety and emergency response. The event closed with a stranding ovation for the volunteers and strong message of appreciation for their tireless work.

DFES' Superintendent Derek Jones and Marine Services Manager Mark Eatts cut a ceremonial ribbon and unveiled the new honour boards, crafted from salvaged timber from the historic Esperance Tanker Jetty. The boards proudly display the names of those who have served with distinction across the decades, ensuring their legacy is remembered by generations to come.

Members and guests enjoyed an informal supper, sharing stories, reconnecting with old friends, and welcoming new members into the fold. The atmosphere was one of pride and camaraderie, reflecting the strong sense of community that underpins both SES and Marine Rescue in Esperance. The evening served as a reminder not only of how far the units have come, but of the enduring values of volunteerism, resilience, and service that continue to drive their success.



JOINT EMERGENCY SERVICES EXERCISE MARGARET RIVER

Over 50 emergency services personnel from eight agencies - WAPOL, DFES, Margaret River SES, St John Ambulance WA, Volunteer Marine Rescue, VFRS, VFES, Surf Life Saving, together with a team of local volunteer actors participated in an epic, simulated mass casualty event on Sunday 4th May at Gracetown Park in WA's south west.

It was a high-stakes, high-coordination operation that would make even the most seasoned Incident Controller pause for breath. The Coordinator on this occasion, however, was 18 year old SES Volunteer Joshua (Josh) Yates.

Josh, who is also a volunteer firefighter with the Wallcliffe Brigade, was appointed Margaret River SES Training Officer in August 2024, yet for 18 year old Josh, age is no barrier. He faced the challenge of planning and coordinating the inter-agency training exercise head on. Together with Margaret River's other Training Manager, Sarah Schuenemann, Josh spent over five months bringing the complex event to fruition.

Josh was determined to create a realistic scenario in a plausible environment. To achieve this to best effect, volunteer actors were engaged to mimic human casualties using injury moulage; his philosophy being that the more realistic the training then the better prepared emergency responders will be.

Preparations for the exercise commenced in October and from February onward Josh was devoting hours to the event each day, eventually working full time on the preparations for the last month.

Training for the event was conducted on a weekly basis culminating in a monthly preparatory emergency scenario, initially on a small scale which was scaled up to the final inter-agency exercise – an event they plan to hold annually.

Josh recalled the major challenge was accommodating each agencies' needs and training requirements within a scenario where everyone had a distinct role but would work together as a cohesive team.


He commended the dedication of the exercise's participants; the majority of whom were local community volunteers. This was a testament to what Josh describes as an amazing sense of community – that nearly 80 people gave up many hours of personal time training over many months and, in the final exercise, giving up their Sunday, in order to help their local community if the worst was to occur.

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KUNUNURRA SES ASSIST POLICE IN SEARCH FOR MISSING MAN IN RUGGED TERRAIN OF CARR BOYD RANGES

Andy's Chasm (pictured below) is located on the rugged Carr Boyd Ranges, south of Kununurra in WA's Kimberley region.

It can only be accessed by four-wheel-drive vehicles and is well known to Kununurra locals.

Hiking through the chasm is challenging and involves climbing over rocks and swimming across water to continue the trek.

A young man was reported missing in late March after he failed to resurface from the waters of Andy's Chasm.

Local authorities initiated a three day search conducted by Kununurra Police, Kununurra SES volunteers and St John Ambulance staff. Aerial assets were also employed during the search.

Unfortunately the body of the 23 year old was recovered two days after being reported missing. Two other people, a man and a woman, both in their 20s, were transferred to Kununurra Hospital but discharged the day after.

Shire of Wyndham East Kimberley President David Menzel said the man's death was a tragedy for the local community and first responders.

A gentleman slipped at the base and sustained a badly broken and dislocated ankle.

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Albany and Denmark SES Crews Assist in Mount Hallowell Rescue

SES crews came to the rescue of an injured teenage hiker on Thursday as they carried him down a summit of more than 250 metres after he rolled his ankle.

St John Ambulance were called at 12.20pm to help the teenage male who had tripped on a rock near the top of Mount Hallowell in Ocean Beach, near Denmark.

After St John crews performed first aid, two crews from Albany and Denmark SES were tasked with taking the teenager down the mount as he could not walk on his own.

The two crews took five hours to find and carry the stretcher bound teenager down the steep track, reaching the bottom at 5.50pm.


A Department of Fire and Emergency services spokesperson said the crews considered phoning in the RAC rescue helicopter for an airlift rescue before deciding to brave the track themselves.

St John ambulance took him to Denmark Health Service under normal road speed at 6pm where he his ankle was treated.

The Mount Hallowell trail is 5.5km long and part of the Bibbulman Track and offers views of Monkey Rock and the Denmark coastline.

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

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Collie SES Youth in Emergency Services Cadet Program



In September 2024 Collie SES initiated a vision to establish a Youth in Emergency Services (YES) program in the South West region. The program was born from a commitment to empower local youth, strengthen future emergency response capabilities and foster greater understanding and collaboration across multiple emergency services. Those other services include Marine Rescue Bunbury, St. John Ambulance Collie Branch, local Bushfire brigades and the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA). Each agency will contribute to the delivery of training sessions, demonstrations and real world exposure to their specific areas of emergency response.

Following months of dedicated planning, community consultation and inter-agency support, the Collie YES program was officially launched on 30 April 2025 with 16 cadets enrolled and participating in two foundation training sessions. The focus of the foundation sessions was on Unit Familiarisation, the Code of Conduct and Unit Rules.

Cadets were warmly welcomed and given a comprehensive introduction to the program, the facility and expectations. Community engagement is a strong element of the program, so a dedicated parent and caregiver information session was held alongside the cadet program to provide families with an understanding of the YES Cadet initiative. A multi-agency training calendar that includes the following modules has already been developed:

- Introduction to YES Cadets and Code of Conduct
- Introduction to Communications
- Introduction to Search
- Equipment familiarisation
- Team Building and Communication Exercises
- Introduction to Basic General Rescue (BGR)

The YES Program is not just a youth initiative –it's an investment in the community's future. Benefits include:

- Future Ready Volunteers
- Increased Community Resilience
- Stronger Local Networks
- Skill Development and
- Youth Engagement

With the enthusiastic involvement of cadets and the strong support of their families, Collie SES—together with the other participating agencies—is confident the program will continue to grow in both strength and impact. They look forward to the program's next stages and remain committed to supporting cadets as they begin their meaningful journey in emergency services and community leadership.

Strong expressions of interest continue to be received from young people keen to join.

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HBF TRAUMA TED TO THE RESCUE

Birth of the SES Trauma Teddy

S tate Emergency Service (SES) Road Accident Rescue (RAR) teams can now offer comfort to children involved in road accidents with the aid of HBF Trauma Ted.

RAR teams throughout the State now have Trauma Ted to help children cope with the stress of road accidents.

Boddington SES has also benefited with equipment worth more than \$15,000 funded by corporate sponsor HBF.

The new hydraulic rescue equipment and Trauma Ted will greatly assist Boddington SES in road accident rescue operations.

The grant means the Boddington SES will be even better equipped for road accident rescue, particularly on the extremely busy and accident prone Albany Highway.

Boddington SES Manager Wayne English said the Boddington SES serviced an 80km radius as well as a 170km stretch of Albany Highway from Armadale to Williams.

"This area is remote as far as emergency response services go, so the travelling community is totally reliant on our services within this area," he said.

HBF Sponsorship Manager Fennela Gallagher said HBF was proud to pro-
